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WHY I WROTE THIS BOOK

I've always been drawn to "projects" – working on an old car, fixing things (or at least, trying to fix things) around the house, finishing furniture, etc. Like most people who undertake these sort of things, I've never really had any interest in doing any of it as a vocation. To me, the pressures that come from getting it done "on time and under budget" would likely ruin that pristine swell of satisfaction one gets from completing something TANGIBLE, something you can look at and enjoy every day as a testament to your work and planning.

The perspective of someone not deeply immersed in a given trade as a VOCATION is certainly different than someone who is. I purposely broke this project down to its elements, avoided the use of any terminology that would not be self-evident, and in short, attempted to make no assumptions that any part of this process was a 'given'.
